OBJECTIVES

1. Understand how research-related regulations are developed and enacted into law,
2. Identify challenges in the oversight of human subject protection and/or animal experimentation
3. Identify strategies for data management, integrity, and security,
4. Recognize regulatory and practical issues in the inclusion of minorities and underserved populations in research,
5. Apply a practical model of ethical analysis for resolving cases in biomedical research,
6. Identify strategies for effective training in research integrity.

NEEDS

This conference will provide an opportunity for representatives from various government regulatory agencies, researchers, clinicians involved in research, and community members to meet in a common forum to identify and discuss ethical challenges and concerns. It will provide federal regulators and compliance officers with the opportunity to listen to and learn from the various stakeholders affected by research as well as teach and inform researchers the nature and objective of federal regulation and oversight.
